



What is a charter school?

- A charter school is a public school, and it may provide instruction in any of grades K-12.
- A charter school is usually created or organized by a group of teachers, parents and community leaders or a community-based organization, and it is usually sponsored by an existing local public school board or county board of education.
- A charter school is generally exempt from most laws governing school districts, except where specifically noted in the law.
- Charter school pupils are required to participate in all statewide assessments that are applicable to pupils in noncharter public schools.
- Public charter schools may not charge tuition and may not discriminate against any pupil on the basis of ethnicity, national origin, gender, or disability.



Are charter schools part of the Public School System?

Yes. Charter schools are under the jurisdiction of the Public School System, as specified in California Education Code (EC) Section 47615.




In Los Angeles Unified School District...



2 Types of Charter Schools








GENERAL DESCRIPTION

AFFILIATED

INDEPENDENT

- Public schools governed by the LAUSD that are <u>SEMIAUTONOMOUS</u>, which <u>operate in accordance with</u> <u>district policy, Education Code, and</u> <u>state regulations</u> but with <u>flexibility</u> <u>in the areas of curriculum, utilization</u> <u>of categorical block grant, local</u> <u>school governance, and some</u> <u>aspects of employee selection</u>.
- FULLY AUTONOMOUS public schools governed by their own Board of Directors and operate in accordance with the California Charter Schools Act.





AFFILIATED

ENROLLMENT

INDEPENDENT

- Determined by neighborhood of attendance.
 - If additional space is available, enrollment is open to students who want to attend, using random public lottery.
- Under PSC, determined by neighborhood of attendance.
- If additional space exists, enrollment is open to students who want to attend, using a random public lottery.

BUDGET

AFFILIATED

INDEPENDENT

- Locally funded through a **Block Grant** (per **average daily attendance**).
- Has discretion over categorical and the Economic Impact Aid portion only, to implement charter goals and mission.
- Non-categorical portion of budget is LAUSD-administered.
- Pays indirect cost of categorical portion of budget for oversight and use of District facilities.
- Limited flexibility to allocated resources according to charter goals.

- Receive funds directly from the State via the <u>County Office of Education</u>.
- Block Grant funded (per Average Daily Attendance) directly.
- May apply for **Title I funding** directly.
- Pays 1-3% to LAUSD for oversight.
- Pays a percentage of Assembly Bill 602 (allocated per Average Daily Attendance) to contribute to the District's special education costs.
- Charter schools are responsible for rental of facilities and related costs.

Decision-Making Authority Over Resource Allocation

AFFILIATED

- Must follow applicable State and Federal Laws.
- Locally designed governance structure and accountability in accordance to collective bargaining agreements.



INDEPENDENT

- Must follow applicable State and Federal Laws.
- Locally designed governance structure and accountability.
- Fiduciary responsibility held by non-profit Board of Directors with oversight by the LAUSD Board of Education, Los Angeles County of Education or the California State Board of Education.

AFFILIATED

- May choose texts, methods and curriculum according to charter goals and mission.
 - Innovation is encouraged.
 - State funds may only be used on State-approved instructional materials.

INDEPENDENT

- Choice of instructional, standards-based materials.
- State funds may only be used on State-approved instructional materials.



AFFILIATED

- Must meet State standards and administer Staterequired tests.
 - May have flexibility in LAUSD required tests.

INDEPENDENT

 Must meet State standards and administer Staterequired tests.
